Parish Pastoral Council Region 3 Assembly, Sat May 4, 2024 11am-3pm

At the end of the Diocesan Assembly in October last year, it was announced that Regional Assemblies will be held across the Archdiocese in 2024. There has been many assemblies that have been held and the feedback has been very positive. Our Assembly will be held on Saturday May 4,2024 (which is very soon)

11am – 3pm at Sacred Heart College, Champagnat Campus (28 Percy Avenue Mitchell Park). There will be clear signage to indicate parking and directions to the presentations.

We are part of Region 3 which includes 9 parishes and 23 schools. The parishes include *Emmaus* (Goodwood, Kingswood, Colonel Light Gardens), *Edwardstown*, *Plympton*, *Glenelg/Glengowrie*, *Brighton*, *Hallett Cove*, *St Ann's* (Seacombe Gardens and St Mary's), *Aberfoyle Park and Blackwood*. Our Region also includes 23 schools which are connected to the parishes.

In preparation for our Region 3 Assembly many regular meetings have been held since December last year. These meetings have resulted in meeting, communicating and developing friendships with many members of other parishes and schools. We have exchanged ideas together, shared our hopes for the future and discussed the problems and obstacles that exist for all of us.

The Assembly will be a time of gathering, meeting, conversing, eating (yummy morning tea and Sausage sizzle lunch), enjoying each other's company and discussing just what is going on in each of our parishes and schools. By celebrating what is already happening we can be inspired and hopefully get a new 'lease of life' for our church and school.

The plan of the day will consist of a number of presentations from a variety of ministries and activities which are carried out in our schools and parishes. Our Church will present 2 short presentations. Our School will be displaying exciting happenings which have recently occurred during the year.

At the end of the presentations there will be an opportunity to write comments and join discussion groups.

All school families and parishioners in our parish are invited to this event. This is also a great opportunity to put into practice the vision set out by our Archdiocese

in Being Church Together.

Parish Finance Council

Have you ever taken a few minutes to look around the church building and wonder at how good it looks after 30 plus years. This is mainly due a number of volunteers who are kept busy with working bees, and general maintenance as well as special projects. Over the last year or so we have repaired a number of the sliding windows and doors, the window sills have all be lacquered. The toilets cisterns have been repaired and are now leak proof, for the time being. The roof has been repaired a number of times and whilst this is on ongoing concern we have been able to minimise the water damage. We have secured all of the locks on the air conditioners compressors, so no more little fingers turning off the units outside. The tabernacle has been stripped down and is undergoing refurbishment. A purpose built table is ready to be installed once we have approval from the Archdiocese. Most of the burnt out heaters have been replaced with new ceiling tiles, damaged tiles have also been replaced and

we are progressively replacing the old lighting with more modern led spotlights – just waiting for the next delivery of new ceiling tiles to continue the project. Whilst we had the scaffolding we have removed many of the metal hooks that have



served their purpose. All of these changes take time and effort but it has made the

inside of the church look very neat and clean at very minimal or no cost.

Thanks to all of have provided skills, knowledge and time – without your support if would be a vastly different.



Students run for Project Compassion

More than 500 Year 5 and 6 students from seven Catholic primary schools came together in beautiful weather to participate in the 2024 Caritas Fun Run on February 19.



The students completed either a 3km walk or 6km run on the sand starting from Angus Neill Reserve and looping between Brighton and Seacliff.

Ben Ryan, APRIM at St Martin de Porres, said the event gave the children the opportunity to physically challenge themselves and kick off the season of Lent and their fund raising for Project Compassion.

"Tracey Tessitore, from Caritas, passionately encouraged the students to think about the giftedness of their lives and to consider where their Project Compassion donations go," Ben said.

"Following the run on the beach, the students participated in a treasure hunt in the park, where they searched for 30 hidden 20 cent pieces that symbolically represented the 30 pieces of silver paid to Judas.

"It was explained to the children that they were taking these silver pieces and instead of turning away from God's will, like Judas, they were turning towards God's will by transferring the silver pieces into a donation for Project Compassion."

The 30 pieces of silver were then placed into one of the iconic Project Compassion boxes.

Oz Harvest have produced an interesting report recently in relation to global & Australian food waste:

- One in nine people globally do not have enough food to eat, that's 793 million people who are undernourished
- If one quarter of the food currently lost or wasted around the world could be saved it would be enough to feed 870 million hungry people
- Majority of food waste in Australia comes from our homes (2.5 million tonnes)
- More than 25 million hectares of land in Australia is wasted to grow food that is not eaten
- 3.7 million households in Australia struggled to put food on the their table this year
- The number one reason households in Australia struggle to put food on the table is the cost of living

'Holy Smoke' during Mass—why?

Let my prayer be counted as incense before you (Psalm 141.2)

After Holy Week and the Easter Vigil this year, a number of you asked why incense was prominently used. In this article, I highlight the evocative symbolism of incense—for nothing is 'just for show' in Catholic liturgies.

The use of incense by the Church is biblical and liturgical, a continuation and extension of ancient Israel's tradition. In the Psalms, incense is compared to our prayers rising up to our Heavenly Father (cf Revelation 5.8).

The cloudy fragrance of incense conveys a sense of mystery and awe to our celebrations, the amazing gift of God's presence among us (Exodus 30.1, 6). Jesus' burning passion for us and for our world is made tangible ('I have eagerly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer,' Luke 22.15) as we participate in Christ's great thanksgiving to his Father. Good worship involves all of our senses: sight, sound, taste, touch, and smell. Just as the pungent aroma of, let's say, an orange, eludes simple description it silently points to an experience of rich delight. So, too, does incense in the liturgy: it reminds us of the transcendent 'aroma of



Christ' (2 Corinthians 2.15). We share in Christ's pleasing fragrance through our anointing with the Oil of Chrism in our Baptism and Confirmation.

Incense is not used during every Mass, of course. But when it is used, it is intended to reveal the sublime transcendence of each Mass, beyond space and time—the amazing blending of worship of God in Heaven with that of ours on Earth, made possible only by the life, death, resurrection and ascension of Jesus Christ (cf Revelation 8.5). Costly incense does not have an obvious or practical purpose: 'it is a prodigal waste of precious material... the pouring out of unwithholding love' (Romano Guardini, *Sacred Signs*). What else is worship of God? Recall Mary (sister of Martha and Lazarus) who anointed Jesus with pure, super-expensive nard before his death (John 12.1-8). Her lavish act foreshadowed the worship of the Church as it makes real and present the Eternal Sacrifice of Christ.

At various points the solemnity of Holy Mass is accompanied by the use of incense: the Book of the Gospels; the gifts of bread and wine placed on the altar; the altar cross and the altar itself; the priest's sacred ministry; and the people, through the dignity of baptism in Jesus the 'Christ' (meaning, 'the Anointed One')—each are reverently incensed. The Church asks nothing while she incenses. She simply conveys adoration and thanksgiving to God for God's great glory. We are purified and sanctified as this 'holy smoke' mingles with, and transforms, the humble devotion of our hearts.

Grains of incense (traditionally resins from special trees—frankincense and myrrh among them) are placed by the priest on burning coals in a censor held by metal chains called a thurible. The wafting smell and smoke which cloud the church is meant to bring to mind the Upper Room, a city called Heaven, and all things that take us to higher ground. The mystery of mere mortals made worthy to commune with God Almighty is breathtaking, defying all our words and actions. Grace upon grace.

Incense is closely woven into the Passion of Christ. Five grains of encapsulated incense are embedded in the Paschal Candle during the Easter Vigil. These five grans represent the five wounds of Jesus—one for each hand, each foot, and the spear that pierced his side. The use of incense during Mass, especially during the prime celebrations of Easter and Christmas, is intended to draw us 'more gloriously' into worship of the Mystery of God's Love for all Creation.

This is also why incense is used during funerals: the earthly remains of the deceased are incensed because our human bodies are Temples of the Holy Spirit through Holy Baptism. Love is stronger than death. Equally, the prayers of the faithful rise up to God like incense and send the deceased home to God in confident hope of God's mercy and love.

Whether or not incense is used during the celebration of Mass or other liturgies, let us pray for the grace to recognise that the collective prayers of the faithful, brimming with humble gratitude and exultant praise (beautifully brought to fragrant expression through the use of incense), are always a sweet-smelling sacrifice to our Loving God.

MY JOURNEY TO LIFE WITH MOTHER, MARY MACKILLOP - Denise Davis 2024

I was baptised in 1940 at St Joseph's Catholic Church, West Brunswick which was our family parish church and later began my primary schooling at the adjoining parish primary school in 1945. The school was run by the Sisters of St Joseph who appeared up front in my life for the next 3 years. The strict discipline, the clanking of rosary beads and the swish of air as they passed by in their long voluminous habits was a constant as was the sharp poking of a ruler if caught slouching or leaning at the desk. The starched wimple hid any sign of their humanity or personality, I presumed that they all belonged to St Joseph and were very holy. Upon reflection, I realise that there was never any mention of their founder, St Mary MacKillop who had died a little over 40 years previously, so I had no knowledge of her at all at this period in my life. Our

family moved to our new home Greensborough, (outer suburb of Melbourne) in 1948 and all my primary and secondary schooling then continued under the Sisters of Mercy. My husband Ian Davis and I were married in 1962 in Melbourne. Ian was educated by the Marist Brothers as a boarder at Assumption College,

Kilmore. We were both active parishioners and raising our children in the Catholic faith...as we had both been raised.

In the early 1970's we moved to the little township of Melrose in the Southern Flinders Ranges, 300km north from Adelaide. This total change of lifestyle was exciting until we realised that we had now lost the support of our families, friends and church communities in the upbringing of our family of four young children. The Booleroo Centre parish church was 18 km south-east and the closest Port Augusta parish church 24kms north at Wilmington. It was then we discovered that there was a Josephite Motor Mission based at Port Augusta which covered the large area north of the Ranges. Sr Elizabeth Morris SJ was my first contact with this Mission

and she became my steadfast friend and mentor in the continuing religious education of our family. It was Sr Elizabeth who brought Mother Mary MacKillop into my life. I was fascinated by the early history of this region which had been serviced firstly by the Jesuits riding horseback from Sevenhill across the vast Willochra Plains in the 1870's and then the courage and faith of the St Josephite Sisters who followed in their footsteps. The Motor Mission Sisters brought the new Vatican II changes in religious education to us during the 1970's. There was a three-weekly circuit of school and home visits where the Sisters supported each family in their own faith journeys plus religious seminars, preparation for the Sacraments, school holiday camps at Pekina and a regular Friday evening gathering group of teenagers who met at Melrose for some time.

The Sisters were given permission to stay overnight with a parish family during the week to save the time and energy that it had previously taken to return to Port Augusta each night. I always felt it was so reminiscent of the journeys Mother Mary MacKillop had taken herself over 100 years previously. And so our family was raised in faith with the blessing and guidance of the Josephites and our various parish priests.

After our children had all moved away on to their chosen paths, Ian and I moved south to Mannum in 1999. We found it such a blessing and so exciting to have our own church and church community at Mannum and both became actively involved. Sr Elizabeth continued walking with us and called in whenever she was in the area.

At this time, I was actively researching and writing the Lyddy family history and made the amazing discovery that two of my husband's great-aunts had entered

service with Mother Mary at Gouger Street,
Adelaide in the 1860's prior to her
excommunication. A trip to the wonderful
MacKillop Centre at Penola followed where
we located two references to these young
women in correspondence between Fr
Tennyson Woods and Mother Mary
MacKillop.

My husband died suddenly in June 2009 at Mannum and my life was shattered. Slowly I began to focus on how I could live this confronting new life. I moved to Woodcroft in 2010 and began attending Mass at the MacKillop chapel at nearby Emmaus school and it was there that I finally found my inner peace. I went to Sydney in 2011 for a couple of weeks to help find my independence and travel alone. I spent one

blessed day at the MacKillop Centre at North
Sydney and found the peace and comfort
there that has given me the faith and courage
to continue my journey of life.

I contracted a chronic illness in 2019 which has led to my health slowly diminishing. So I now find myself walking with Mother Mary MacKillop and contemplating her

ill-health in her aging years too. She is with me constantly and I feel so deeply blessed to have her presence so strongly in my life. I pray daily to her for faith and courage in my prayer life and in my daily life...and look

forward to meeting her in the not too distant future!

PS The cycle of life continues...Sr Elizabeth Morris SJ has been commissioned to write the history of the Motor Mission Sisters in South Australia and I have had the privilege of being one of the proof readers for this manuscript...

This year I came across an idea for a Resurrection garden—this is a beautiful way to share with your children the story of Holy week as you add pieces to the garden each day.


I had a great time putting mine together and talking to my grand daughters about the garden.



Worldwide Marriage Encounter, Inc. is a nonprofit organization faithful to the Roman Catholic Church's definition that marriage is a covenant that exists between one man and one woman. Any reference to "marriage" or "couple" made by WWME is in this context.





The Marian Procession

The Marian Procession began in 1949 and is the longest running consecutive Catholic event in Australia. This year the Procession celebrates 75years and will continue its path in the streets of the Adelaide CBD. It began and flourished at the Rostrevor Seminary and has been hosted in an array of venues such as various parklands throughout the CBD, the Adelaide Showgrounds and once in the Cathedral due to inclement weather.

The Marian Procession is a wonderful opportunity to gather communities together and provide a prayerful experience with Mary at the centre. For the first time we will not gather behind community/parish signs provided by the Archdiocese, rather focus on walking together, as One Church.

Each year a different Marian image or theme is selected for the Procession aimed to highlight a feast or event within the Catholic Church or celebrate a local community or parish.

This year, we celebrate the Marian Procession on Pentecost Sunday. The Procession is followed by a time of prayer, a reflection on the Gospel, a collection and concludes with benediction.

The simplicity has always been and will remain in the act of gathering, praying the rosary and coming together in community to be a public witness of our Catholic faith.

Q&A

Why has the route changed?

Due to a Port Adelaide Football club home game and road closures surrounding this, there is no access to the 2023 starting location in the Torrens Parade Ground.

How will I find my community/group/parish when I arrive?

This year, community/parish name signs previously provided by the Archdiocese will not be put out. There will be coloured signs that can be used as designated meeting points if necessary. We hope this will encourage us as a Catholic Community to walk together, as One Church. Communities and Parishes are still welcome to bring their banners or icons of Mary to process with.

What is the distance of the procession? Approximately 1.5kms

If I do not belong to a Parish/Community, can I still process?

YES! All are welcome to join no matter your experience.

What do I need to bring or wear?

Rosary beads, umbrella, appropriate footwear What if I cannot process?

The Rosary will be led from Victoria Square where the choir will also be singing. To ensure we are all following the same prayers and hymns, there will be speakers scattered throughout the procession using Bluetooth connections.

What if the weather is inclement?

The Procession will still take place (unless there is a severe weather warning) however the liturgy will be moved from Victoria Square to the Cathedral.

How will we know if the event location has changed or if the event is cancelled?

The best way to keep up to date is via our facebook page or website.

Where is the best place to park?

Public transport is a great option given the CBD location, however parking is available surrounding Victoria Park or on Wakefield Rd.

Will there be transport from Victoria Square back to the starting point?

There will be buses available at the conclusion of the liturgy for drop off to the starting location.

Will there be facilties available?

There will be toilets available at both the start and finishing points of the procession.

Will there be seating?


Yes, seating will be provided but capped at 1500 seats.

Will there be food and water available?

The SA water Quench bench will be available in Victoria Sq to rfill persomal bottles. Some water will be provided at the beginning and end of the procession, but we strongly encourage all participants to bring their own water bottles. No food will be provided at the event.

How long does the event go for in total?

The Procession and time of prayer following should conclude at approx. 4pm.
