Cleaning the church—fulfilling an early calling

Your first job—do you recall what it was? I certainly do. At around 13 years of age, I began working alongside my mother cleaning apartment units. Over 50 years later, I'm still cleaning—no longer apartment units but my own house—and, each month, St Martin de Porres Church.

My step-father and mother struggled to rent a modest three-bedroom unit within a sprawling 450-unit apartment complex (featuring a mini golf course, two tennis courts and a large swimming pool) near Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Having befriended the manager of the apartment complex, my mother offered to help with the

never-ending task of cleaning units (after units had been vacated and before new tenants moved in). Our family didn't have a lot of money, so my mother's bargain was that I would, along with my two younger brothers, help her clean units during the summer to defray the



cost of the swimming pool fees. With our help, she could clean more units per week than usual. Clean units from early morning during the school holidays, spend the afternoon in the cool, sparkling pool during the hot, humid summer-yes!

My mother was a hard worker—and a tough taskmaster. As her eldest, I was expected to do a very good job vacuuming carpets and cleaning ceiling tiles. I didn't mind the vacuuming (or her

exacting inspections!), but cleaning the ceiling tiles—and repositioning them in the kitchen and bathroom areas of units, was especially challenging. Ceiling tiles in the early 1970s were hard to clean and even more temperamental to reposition.

When Carrie and I, and our two children, relocated from Brisbane to Hallett Cove in late 2004, we began attending Mass at St Martin de Porres Church (I was later received into the Church in March 2006). Immediately, I noticed that our church's internal ceiling featured ceiling tiles similar to those that I had encountered in those Pennsylvania apartment units so many years ago. I truly love our church—but I try not to look up during Mass!

I've been cleaning the church as part of a small crew of 2-3 parishioners for several years. Because I'm relatively young, fit and healthy, I don't mind vacuuming and other cleaning tasks. It usually takes about an hour for our crew to clean the church. Best of all, we don't clean the ceiling tiles!

We've often heard appeals for volunteers to be rostered to assist with various ministries that serve our parish community. Reading, counting collections, cleaning, etc. What might you be able to contribute, mindful that to assist the community is not a 'forever commitment'. Our contribution to the gathered community is an expression of our baptismal vocation. Even cleaning! Consider contributing what you can for a time. We celebrate Mass not as passive spectators but as active participants in the life of the Church.

It was a very informative and enjoyable gathering where valuable networking occurred between Catholic Schools and parishes. At the close of this Assembly it was announced that Regional Assemblies will be held across the Archdiocese in 2023. Members of the PPC will join the online information sessions for details regarding the purpose, planning and support of the Regional Assemblies. We look forward to sharing information about this event later this year.

Thanks to parishioners who participated in Searching Parish Engagement Survey (SPES). We are looking forward to receiving the results from Leuven University. Our Strategic Plan launch was very successful at both masses on 5 &6 November. These celebrations were followed with food and refreshments. A framed copy of our plan is now on display in the church foyer. We thank all the parishioners and members of the Hallett Cove Community for their valuable input in the writing of our Strategic Plan. We also thanked Brian Spencer for his help and guidance in the development of our Plan. It is wonderful to see the 3 areas of our Plan is already a working document.

Ministry: Kevin Liston held a number of workshops during Advent which explored the Gospel and other accounts for a contemporary understanding of the Christmas story. This experience deepened our relationship with Jesus and our spiritual vision. Deacon Tim conducted an Advent Scripture Reflection to allow God to deepen our embrace of the "heart of a disciple". Fr Prahap lead Advent discussion groups in the Brighton Parish. The Rosany group continued every

Brighton Parish. The Rosary group continued every Thursday night during Advent showing us different ways to pray this wonderful prayer. This Rosary group will continue on Thursdays fortnightly @6.30 and Deacon Tim will continue conducting Scripture Reflection group meetings fortnightly @7pm in the church. As the Lenten season approaches Kevin Liston will be presenting an experience based on a contemporary

understanding of the Easter Story.

Synodality is a Church word for inclusive leadership, listening to the sense of faith of the faithful, a rejection of autocratic and patriarchal decision making.

The Church around the world has entered the Continental Stage of Synod of Bishops on Synodality. Kevin Liston and some of our parishioners worked on our church's responses to the Document for the Continental Stage (DCS) questions. More information will be given at a later date.

Community: the regular gatherings after the weekend masses have successfully recommenced after the COVID pandemic. Vinnies did a wonderful job supporting the Giving Tree and Christmas Appeal. Thanks to the many generous people who donated food and clothing and their time to this appeal. Christmas hampers of food, toys & gift cards were packed and delivered at Christmas We celebrated and thanked all Volunteers who help our Parish to be a rich and spirit filled community. Members of the PPC are welcoming our parishioners to the weekend Masses and are available for questions, concerns and chats before and after mass..

<u>Liturgy:</u> Hallett Cove Community Carols were very successful on Friday 9 December. St Martin de Porres school had 2 groups of children participating in Carol singing .Thanks to those people who helped out. Many children participated in the Christmas Eve Vigil Mass. Thanks to all people who helped out with this as well. Australia Day was celebrated with masses at Brighton & Hallett Cove. Many Baptisms have occurred over the last few months.

Easter Lily

Tradition states that the Easter Lily originated in the Garden of Eden from the teardrops of Eve, that spread when she and Adam were cast out of the garden. These were believed to be tears of repentance.

Historians and Bible scholars say that the lily has always been highly regarded in the Christian Church. Jesus even references the flowers in Luke 12:27, stating "Consider the lilies, how they grow. They toil not, they spin not; and yet I say unto you that Solomon in all of his glory, was not arrayed like one of these." Legend has it that, after Our Lord's death and resurrection, lilies were found growing in the Garden of Gethsemane, where Jesus is said to have prayed before his crucifixion. It is believed that they sprung up from a drop of sweat from his brow when Hs head was bent in prayer.

In Easter celebrations, the lily represents Christ's resurrection, and thus new birth and new life. These delicate white blooms can be viewed as pure, innocent and untainted by the world

The flower itself is used in various ways to tell the resurrection story. The bulb is buried in the ground; as a representation of Christ's tomb.

The trumpet shaped flowers also announce life after

death, since bulbed flowers often regrow year after year, according to the religious source All About Jesus

And the trumpet shape signifies the angel Gabriel's trumpet call...



Rosary Ruminations

We come to journey through Lent and an opportunity to reflect upon who Jesus is and what role he may or may not play in our daily lives. The HCP Rosary Group gatherings offers a place of solace and silence in a tranquil and respectful environment with an opportunity away from the busyness of everyday pressures to spend a moment in contemplation and prayer. Ordinary folk of the Parish who take time to reflect upon and contemplate Our Lord in stillness and to `come away with me ... to a quiet place and rest for a while' (Mark 6:31).

Pope John Paul II called the Rosary a Christocentric prayer. A prayer that takes us on a journey of the life of Christ that calls us ever deeper into a renewed relationship of God's presence and promise in our own lives. It is important to quote John Paul II in his entirety to capture his profound respect for the Rosary and its place in our journey of faith: 'Christ is the supreme Teacher, the revealer and the one revealed. It is not just a question of learning what he taught but of "learning him". In this regard could we have any better teacher than Mary? From the divine standpoint, the Spirit is the interior teacher who leads us to the full truth of Christ (cf. Jn 14:26; 15:26; 16:13). But among creatures no one knows Christ better than Mary; no one can introduce us to a profound knowledge of his mystery better than his Mother'.

Pope Benedict XVI describes the Rosary as a school of contemplation and silence. He states that 'at first glance, it could seem a prayer that accumulates words, therefore difficult to reconcile with the silence that is rightly recommended for meditation and contemplation. In fact, this cadent repetition of the Hail Mary does not disturb inner silence but indeed both demands and nourishes it...Thus, in reciting the Hail Mary, we must be

careful that our voices do not "cover" the voice of God who always speaks through the silence like the "still small voice" of a gentle breeze (1 Kgs 19: 12)'.

Pope Francis in his 2023 Lenten Message, says 'the Gospel of the Transfiguration is proclaimed every year on the Second Sunday of Lent. During this liturgical season, the Lord takes us with him to a place apart. While our ordinary commitments compel us to remain in our usual places and our often repetitive and sometimes boring routines, during Lent we are invited to ascend "a high mountain" in the company of Jesus and to live a particular experience of spiritual discipline – ascesis – as God's holy people'. Indeed, the discipline of finding a place of prayer, apart from the busyness of life, in the presence of God.



Lent offers a perfect opportunity to begin anew and take time to reflect upon God's presence in our lives. The Rosary provides an opportunity to slow down, meditate upon and contemplate Christ's story through history, the unfolding of God's salvific plan for us all. We trust that the Rosary Group experience, that heads formally into its fourth year, can offer you a quiet time of being with God, in community.

Our renewed approach to the Rosary in our local HCP Rosary Group enhances our awareness of the insights expressed through Papal commentary in one significant manner. We use only professionally produced audio or visual prayer guides and not any specific person/s from within the Rosary Group. In other words the recitation of the Rosary is through professional recording's with beautiful musical or visual backdrops. It provides the opportunity for each of us to be still, listen, contemplate or respond in whatever ways the Spirit moves us on any given day. We minimise the distraction of counting or of losing our way in the process. We come together as community sharing in and witness to God's benevolence and merciful love. It is therefore a perfect opportunity of being with God rather than the do-ing of prayer.

As indicated with the photos, we also have regular shared suppers after Rosary as often as possible. We attempt to combine the great Marian Feasts of the Assumption (15 Aug), Our Lady of the Rosary (7 Oct) and Immaculate Conception (8 Dec) with the Rosary Group gatherings wherever possible. Speak to any of the Rosarians or contact me for further details. Regular updates for routine times in the Parish Bulletin (1st and 3rd Thursday, usually), and special Liturgical Seasons (Advent, Lent, October are weekly on Thursday) from 6.30 pm. Notice Board and foyer contain lists for Feb-May.

We have had over 510 students commence the year with us across 20 classes so there is always a lot going on.

Our newly appointed student leaders have hit the ground running with school leaders, Michael Scrivener and Asha Fitzgerald, hosting our school assemblies every fortnight, and being very involved in the life of the school.

Our 6 mission leaders and 2 school leaders attended the official Project compassion launch with the ArchBishop Patrick O'Regan and Premier Peter Malinouskous on the 21 Feb at Mercedes College and have also been planning some social justice initiatives with the support of our new Youth Minister Hannah Smailes.

Our House leaders are busy preparing for the largest sporting event of the year when they lead the 4 house Teams, Mackillop, Francis, Martin and Domonic on Sports day on Friday 31 March. Sports day will be held at Bowker Street Oval in Somerton Park.

Staff Commissioning Mass.

Staff and our student choir were involved on the music for the celebration and led the readings and prayers. Mass was followed with a community BBQ on the school grounds which welcomed all families back for the start of the year.

Every January, I need to report to the Archdiocese the numbers of Sacraments celebrated in our parish in the previous year. Here are the stats for Hallett Cove in 2022


• Baptisms 33


Did you hear the one about...

It's mine ... and it's yours

Mandatory Notifiers

Just a reminder to <u>all</u> that as a Volunteers in our parish that you are a "Mandated Notifier", which means that when you undertake your role as a parish volunteer, if you come across any indicators, suspicions or information that suggest a child may be in danger of physical, mental or sexual abuse, you are legally obligated to report this to the Child Abuse Report Line (CARL) on 13 14 78.

Failure to report is an offence under the Children and Young people (Safety) Act, 2017, and currently carries a maximum penalty of \$10,000. This is an individual fine, not an organizational one.

If you become aware of any situation or are unsure of how to deal with it, please talk to Pat (Child Safe Contact Person for the Parish) or the Child Protection Unit of the Adelaide Catholic Archdiocese on 8210 8140 or email childprotection@adelaide.catholic.org.au

We require all those who Volunteer in our parish to undertake Child Protection training, so that they are aware of their obligations. If you have not received this training in the past 3 years, there are copies of the "Mandatory Notification Training Resource – In a Nutshell" available in the foyer.
