PUT ON A NEW SOUL IN THIS NEW YEAR

Dear people of God, we are already well into the first month of the New Year – 2024. We commenced this New Year with grateful and joyful hearts and minds; praying to Our Lord God and wishing well to each other. We may be uncertain of what this New Year will bring and how it will unfold but with good will, great hope and trust in God, we will abide under his blessing. A beautiful life does not just happen but is rather built by daily Prayer, Humility, Sacrifice and Love.

"The object of a New Year is not that we should have a New Year. It is that we should have a new soul" says G. K. Chesterton. Yes, the New Year provides opportunities for us to cultivate a new soul by gracing us with new occasions and prospects to develop ourselves and serve others as willed by the Infant Saviour. The New Year also presents us with an opportunity for a fresh start, a new perspective and the rediscovery of ourselves within the life of Christ. We remember and give thanks for the past year's blessings, despite its challenges, adversities and uncertainties, that through God's grace we remained steadfast. We also thank God for the wonderful Christmas celebration, renewing our confidence that God sent His only begotten Son, Our Saviour, to bring new light and life to our world.

"Stimulate prayer with simplicity and in accordance with Christ's heart" says Pope Francis. In preparation for the 2025 Jubilee Year, Pope Francis has designated 2024 as the YEAR OF PRAYER with a particular emphasis on the 'OUR FATHER'. The Year of Prayer is not a year about prayer, but a year for prayer. The image of Christ in the manger speaks of a God who wants an intimate relationship with His creation. This presents our Church with a significant opportunity to revisit the basics of prayer and for us to become even more a people of prayer. Prayer is our intimate relationship with God through which we develop and grow in a close friendship with Him. He has always been resolute with the necessity for us to constantly grow in a love of prayer on our journey of faith. Pope Francis also asks us to consider how we might help others to pray; so that they too, can experience a personal encounter with the risen Jesus.

To answer this call to spend more time in prayer let us meditate on the Lord's Prayer and be revitalised in the



spirit of prayer as were the first believers and followers of Christ Jesus. Pope Francis stressed that the Our Father prayer be set as the cornerstone of our prayer life. If we are not able to begin our prayer with these two words, then our prayer will go nowhere. We must always begin our prayers with "Our Father" and be mindful that we are his children; we have God as our eternal Father, a father who loves us, and a father who knows all our needs. These words also convey the sense of us being as brothers and sisters; part of one human family rather than as Cain hating his own brother. We are also reminded to forgive, to forget offenses against us, and avoid feelings of anger or a desire for revenge. It is important for each of us to examine our own conscience, reflecting on these words as we ourselves petition the Father for our own forgiveness, St. Mother Teresa of Calcutta says, "Praying the Our Father and living it will lead us toward saintliness for Our Father."

We continue in prayer that the presence of the Lord will fill our lives and our homes; that his Love and Peace will be felt within our families and throughout the world. We pray for the grace to live our life reflecting His love; a reflection that changes the lives of those around us; one that gathers the lost souls, one to heal where love is broken. May God use us in new ways for the Kingdom of God and all for the Glory of the Lord...! Be Blessed Abundantly..!

Fred's Van

Fred's Van is operated by Vinnies with 10 centres operating throughout the state. Last year over 40,000 needy people were fed.

At Christie's Beach we fed 3187 thanks to the amazing volunteers who up each Wednesday and Sunday night cook and serve a free hot nutritious meal to anyone who turns up. We use the commercial kitchen at the Wardli Youth Centre on McKinna Parade, Christie's Beach.

Thanks go to Reggie Dallemule, from our Parish, who plans the menus and shops each week. We have another 2 people who shop for the Sunday service as well

We are always looking for more volunteers, each team is rostered on once a month. We have 4 teams for Wednesday and Sunday nights. Duties include setting up tables and chairs in the hall, wrapping donated bakery items, help prepare the meal and serve the meal, help with the dishes (we have a dishwasher) and generally clean up the kitchen and hall. We serve each meal between 7 and 8 pm. Volunteers arrive around 5pm and most of the time we are out of the centre by 8.15pm.

Thanks also to Greg Schar and his team at Vinnies for the support given throughout the year.

Bob and I have been volunteering at Fred's for over 21 years, it's been such a worthwhile opportunity to help those who are disadvantaged and struggling with what life throws at them. It's great to be able to reach out in some small way to anyone who needs support whether it be a meal or have a talk.

The Pastoral Meaning of Blessings


Almighty ever-living God, who in the abundance of your kindness surpass the merits and desires of those who entreat you, pour out your mercy upon us to pardon what conscience dreads and to give what prayer does not dare to ask (Collect for Twenty-Seventh Sunday of Ordinary Time).

The Vatican recently issued a document to elaborate on Pope Francis' innovative teaching on spontaneous or pastoral blessings offered by clergy (Fiducia Supplicans: On the Pastoral Meaning of Blessings, 18 December 2023). What follows is a paraphrase of some sections of this profound document.

The Holy Father's contribution broadens and enriches of the classical understanding of blessings, which are typically linked to the liturgy (recall the Solemn Blessing at the end of Mass, or the Nuptial Blessing given during a wedding ceremony). By contrast, pastoral blessings are simple and brief, responding to the faith of people who, even in the midst of their everyday life and sins, open their hearts to ask for God's help. Most common is asking for a blessing for rosary beads, a house, a car—or yourself on your birthday!

Clearly, Pope Francis is encouraging clergy to support the faith of people (faith which may be small or great) by assisting them in their weakness with a divine blessing, and to channel their openness to transcendence (which may well lead them to become more faithful to the Gospel). No one should be refused a humble request for the saving presence of God in their lives.

Remember the person in the Gospel who responded to Jesus, Lord, I believe—help my unbelief (Mark 9.23-24)? In such pastoral settings, those seeking a blessing are not required to have prior moral or spiritual perfection.



Blessings descend from God, mediated through God's ministers. One of the earliest and best examples is the Aaronic (priestly) blessing: May the Lord bless you and keep you. May the Lord make his face shine upon you and be gracious to you. May the Lord lift up his countenance upon you and give you peace (Numbers 6.24-26). At the heart of blessings is God's abundant delight in us. Another type of blessing, common in the Psalms, ascends from earth to heaven toward God: Bless the Lord, my soul, and all that is within me, bless God's holy name (Psalm 103.1). We discover our true vocation when we turn to God with praise. Through God's graciousness, we can also extend a blessing toward others. Imagine a parent or grandparent praying: Lord, look upon these children of yours, grant them health, work, peace and mutual help. Free them from everything that contradicts your Gospel and allow them to live according to your will. Amen.

Here's my favourite quote from Pope Francis on blessings: We are more important to God than all the sins we can commit because God is father, God is mother, God is pure love, God has blessed us forever... Even if [our] closest relatives have abandoned [us], because they now judge [us] to be irredeemable, God always sees [us] as God's children.

Our world longs to experience God's peaceable blessing, and the Body of Christ can pass on this blessing as much as it lavishly receives it from God. Our Father loves all of us richly. The only thing that remains is for us to rejoice in God's blessing, to thank God, and to learn from God to bless. May the Lord bless and keep you, now and forever!

Someone once said that 'prayer doesn't help our relationship with God, prayer IS our relationship with God!' and so when we become more devoted to prayer, we are building up that Divine friendship. Being Pilgrims of Hope means that we should always be growing in our love of prayer on our journey of Faith. But the Year of Prayer also asks us to consider how we might help others to pray, so that they can experience a personal encounter with the risen Jesus.

The Year of Prayer is not a year *about* prayer, but a year *for* prayer.

Some suggestions for personal Prayer!!!

Prayer Using Images and Symbols

For centuries Christians have used the senses to remind themselves of the God who created them. Nature and art can speak to our senses of God's presence. Candles, crosses and holy images can help us to see God in a new way and to experience what they remind us of; they can also be used as a focus for our meditation or contemplation.

Lectio Divina

Choose a piece of scripture and read it slowly three times. Pick out the word, words or phrase that speaks to you the most and prayerfully repeat it, listening to what God might be saying to you through it. Allow the word or phrase to guide you in your prayer and think about how you might apply it to your own life in the day or week ahead.

'Work and Prayer' - St Benedict

Any repetitive or mundane task has the potential to elicit, or become, prayer. Whether praying under one's breath as the job is being done, or by offering yourself and the task for God's greater glory, one can begin you live out the words of St Paul and his desire to see Christians pray always.

Meditation

This can involve placing oneself in an event from scripture by assuming the person of one of the characters. You experience the event in your imagination as if you were there, reacting to it as it happens. You then see how that experience might help you to understand what Jesus was teaching, or maybe God has spoken to you in a new way about a biblical story or parable.

Contemplation

One of the aims of contemplation is to simply be in presence of God, as one might with a friend. It is often accompanied by a conscious stilling of our mind and body, which can help us to become aware of God's quiet presence. The repetition of a particular word or phrase, or concentrating on our posture or breathing, can help to remove distractions so that we can focus solely on Him.

The Chosen

The Chosen is a groundbreaking historical drama based on the life of Jesus, seen through the eyes of those who knew him. Set against the backdrop of Jewish oppression in first-century Israel, the series shares an authentic and intimate look at Jesus' revolutionary life and teachings.

I'm honestly really impressed by what the makers of this show have accomplished. It's such a unique take that they've given to the story, this sort of "street-level view" of those people that encountered Jesus. Reading these stories in the Bible again and again makes it easy to become detached from the fact that these were real people living real lives dealing with real struggles, going to work, hanging with friends, making jokes, eating lunch, and stepping in animal poop but they've brought it all to life in an engaging and relatable way where the tight budget seldom shows.

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I love that this show doesn't feel preachy, like most Christian media. The way the camera kind of bobs and sways as it follows the action lends an almost documentarian vibe that makes me feel like I'm simply witnessing a story unfold. No agenda. No sermon. Just good old fashioned storytelling. Of course, we know that there is a very profound message to it all, but the filmmakers are smart enough to let the audience figure it out for themselves without thumping them over the head with "Christian talk."

The actor portraying Jesus does so with an unflinching kindness and empathy that makes him instantly trustworthy and lovable in every. single. scene. So props to him for his amazing work and props to the casting team for finding him!

This is a great show that, even if not suited to everyone's tastes, is bound to challenge our mental perception of these people and their stories. It makes these characters feel real, brings Jesus to life in a new way, and has some fun with artistic license while still honoring God's Word.
