Over the past 2 years our parish has worked extremely hard to develop our Strategic Plan. A draft copy of "Living our Mission" Plan is on display in the church foyer. This plan would not have been possible without the work of Brian Spencer, Kevin Liston, the Parish Pastoral Council members and you, the parishioner. Your input has been wonderful and has resulted in our Catholic Community agreeing upon 3 very important aspects to help make our church a faith filled community. These include Ministry, Community and Liturgy. We know that this work



does not happen overnight, but we can already see some exciting things happening in our community. In the area of Ministry Kevin Liston has conducted a number of workshops during Lent which encouraged us to reflect upon the Words in the Gospels leading up to the celebration of Easter. Deacon Tim conducted a virtual program during Lent which was also very successful. The rosary group every Thursday night has shown us different ways to pray this wonderful prayer.

In Community the regular gatherings after the weekend masses have recommenced after the COVID pandemic. Regular gatherings are in our future plans.

Members of the PPC are welcoming you to the weekend Masses and are available for questions, concerns and chats before and after mass. Although COVID has made it difficult in Liturgy we are currently working with the school to increase the involvement of the children in our church in meaningful ways. Ben Ryan (APRIM) recently helped children to write 'Prayers of the Faithful' prayers during our Pentecost Mass. Recently the parishioners celebrated the week day mass with the children in the school hall. A stronger relationship between our parish and the school is a very important part of our future plans.

Very soon our completed 'Living our Mission' document will be presented to the community. However, once completed this Plan will be a working document.

On behalf of Fr Michael, Fr Prathap and the Parish Pastoral Council we thank everyone for your feedback and ideas that you have presented over the past 2 years.

2022 Diocesan Assembly

The Diocesan Assembly was held in October 2021. This Assembly brought Parishes, Schools and Catholic Communities together. Several members of our Parish Pastoral Council attended this 3 day event. The participants reflected upon many recommendations which were developed in discussion groups in light of the contexts of their own communities, ministries and agencies.

2022 Diocesan Assembly will be held again in October this year. Before the 2022 Assembly we are invited to consider a wide range of recommendations. We feel that you have already provided substantial feedback through our Parish Strategic Planning process which will allow the PPC to provide a response to the Diocese.

St Martin de Porres Parish Finance Council

As a parish keeping an eye on our finances is both wise and necessary – a drop in numbers at regular Saturday and Sunday masses is always going to have a negative impact on our planned giving program. This year we have also had unexpected costs due to essential maintenance. This means that we have spent more than we have received and will need to keep a close eye on the finances over the next few months.

In 2022 we need to look at a Stewardship Renewal. Stewardship is not a one-time act of giving, but rather a way of life that encompasses our weekly envelope contribution, exploring our gifts and the generous sharing of our time and talents within our community – the finance council will continue to working with the Parish Council to find a suitable time to implement this renewal.

You would be aware that Jenny has recently retired, and is no longer able to provide the daily financial transactional support needed. We have accepted an offer from the archdiocese who are now providing an outsourcing for a number of parishes at no cost. In essence the Archdiocese will now manage Accounts Payable, Accounts Receivable & Monthly reports.

On a positive note, both spires were cleaned, descaled and painted ready for our Easter services, sensor lights have been added to the porch which improves both security and provides extra light when walking across the carpark. All of the hydraulic doors have now been serviced and are operating safely. Thank you to the wide range of volunteers who have washed windows, cleaned the church and maintained the gardens both at the Church and at the Parish House - without your help many tasks just won't get done.

As pointed out in the last finance report – we are running at a \$8,500 deficit.

Income is down by about \$6,500
Expenses are up but we needed to repair the doors, lighting to improve security and the costs associate with the vandalism incident.

Salaries will be lower until we fill the current vacancy which will help in the short term.

In addition, Southern Cross Care provide Community and Wellness and Home Care services.

'Awake my soul... I will awake the dawn' (Psalm 57.8)

How do you begin your day—right at the start when conscious awareness dawns? Those moments certainly passed long ago today as you read this article, overtaken by the busyness of life.

However, pause now to reflect on how you typically enter into the grace and light of a new day.

Many of us follow an unconscious routine, stumbling through early morning brain-fog to make a cup of coffee or tea, catch up on the news, scroll through emails or social media posts. It could be 5:45am, or 8am, when our neurones, sensitivities, and tendons begin to fire. Imperceptibly the day unfolds: feeding the dog or cat, going for a walk, preparing breakfast, taking the children or grandchildren to school, driving to work—whatever the next obligation.

These very first thoughts, feelings, and actions affect us throughout the day—whether we acknowledged them or not. How many of yesterday's worries, doubts, pains rush in? Is our new day, in fact, 'new'—or is there a dull, recurring sameness to the day?

As a teenager, I was taken by the buoyant beat and lyrics of Carole King's 1971 song, Beautiful:

You've got to get up every morning
With a smile in your face
And show the world all the love in your heart

It did not take long for me to realise that, some days, I did not even want to get out of bed. Over the years, I realised that what gets me out of bed is not about how I am feeling—it is not about what I decide about the day, but what I receive and discover. This new day is a gift, a gift given by God.

When I first discovered the Scriptures during my university studies, a passage from the Old Testament Book of Lamentations changed the way I think about the dawn: 'The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, the Lord's mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness' (Lamentations 3.22-23). God's presence is new every morning, what a gift—perfect and complete! The grace of starting the day with God's thoughts and feelings had a wonderful effect on my own thoughts and feelings. Truly, God's Word 'is a lamp unto my feet' (Psalm 119.105).



Many have found solace in beginning the day with a brief prayer of thanksgiving: 'Thank you, Lord, for this new day of life (or: of love, of grace)'. Blessing ourselves with the sign of the cross can be a powerful, bodily action that remind us of the true light of a new day: in God's light we see true light (Psalm 36.9). When we become mindful afresh that 'I am a child of God, beloved by God our Father'—we are consoled by the meaning and purpose of our baptism.

The very first prayer in the Divine Office (a set of psalms and prayers prayed morning and evening by clergy, religious and other interested believers), reminds us that praising our Maker and Redeemer is itself God's gift, a moment of grace: 'Lord, open my lips—and my mouth shall proclaim your praise'.

My morning ritual often leads to quiet meditation and scripture reading. From this time I like taking one sparkling phrase and let it linger as a mantra throughout the day, much like a rough gemstone is tumbled repeatedly until it produces a smooth, attractive gem. Here a just a few of my memorised favourites: 'in you, O Lord, all find their home'; 'where sin abounds, grace abounds all the more'; 'in your will is our peace'. What are yours? How might your day change by bring them to mind and heart?

Every new day is a God-given gift—don't let it go unwrapped. While it is normal and natural for the dawn to awaken us, why not enter into the grace of 'awaking the dawn' with moments of gratitude for the many tender mercies of God, new every morning?

In the six months to December 2021 - Vinnies have recorded a 25% increase in demand for assistance for emergency funds to help people access food and pay rent compared to the same period in 2020.

Across the State Vinnies are seeing a deepening homelessness crisis due to a severe shortage of affordable housing and an extremely competitive real estate market which is making fewer properties available to those who really need them. Whole families are living in temporary accommodation including in cars and tents because they have nowhere else to go.

As a Vinnies organisation we have been able to achieve the following in this same period:

- Safe and secure accommodation for 251 men, 300 women, 225 children and 80 pets
- 13,326 hot meals to people experiencing homelessness or disadvantage
- Financial and material support for 20,127 people struggling to meet the basic cost of living
- Financial, material, education and advocacy support for 3,192 refugees and asylum seekers

Hallett Cove Vinnies really appreciate your continued generous support for our group.

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Africa Food Crisis Appeal

After three years of poor rainfall, some of the worst locust plagues seen in decades, and ongoing conflict, displacement and the impacts of COVID-19, millions of people are facing hunger and even starvation across the Horn of Africa. According to the recently released Global Report on Food Crises, nearly 193 million people are in need of urgent assistance, an increase of nearly 40 million since 2020. Caritas Australia has launched the Africa Food Crisis Appeal to provide urgently needed humanitarian aid to countries in the Horn of Africa, including Ethiopia, Somalia and Eritrea. Through partners on the ground, donations to Caritas Australia's Africa Food Crisis appeal will go towards food distributions, support for children impacted by malnutrition, clean drinking water, cash transfers to households at risk of poverty, hygiene supplies as well as seeds and household items for families that have been displaced by conflict.
