After our recent Diocesan Spring Gathering there has been feedback in the parish regarding its positive outcomes. As we have all been reminded, we need to be prepared for determining the future changes of the Archdiocese. The Parish Pastoral Council will be giving more feedback to the parish in the New Year.

The forward plans for Marymount College and St Teresa's have also been recently announced as we look at the future of local schools. There are no proposed changes for St Martin de Porres School.

With my retirement in 2018, and Fr Peter's one year later, this will affect our parishes and change them from our present status. The Vicar General tells me I shall be replaced with another parish priest but it is too soon to know if there will be a replacement for Fr Peter. We need to start preparing for change here.

With the lesser number, and ageing of the clergy, we priests are not able to respond to the needs of all parishioners at all times as we would wish, and which was so in the past. Funerals, weddings, baptisms, nursing home visits, hospital calls all need to be arranged as far ahead as possible. With short notice requests, eg funerals, we do our best to be available at the time and date requested.

Although we are busy, priests are never too busy to respond to your personal needs. We have as a priority the pastoral care of our parishioners. Please do not hesitate to contact us when you want our help.

In light of the many changes taking place now, and will continue into the future, we can perhaps use this Advent as a time to prepare for Jesus coming to us this Christmas, and prayerfully discern what we need to prepare for in the years ahead. The Holy Spirit is with us and will guide us.

My Story (continued)

At the start of the Novitiate I had six companions, but at the end we were only four. On 3rd June, 2000 I received my first profession.

These vows are only for one year.

For the next three years, I renewed my vows annually before the 3rd of June. It is also a first commitment to God and saying

that I have come to do your will and accept me. At this ceremony, we could invite only three people from our family. My family were disappointed because they were not able to come. Not only that, it is almost 9 hours by train. I invited my parents and my Sister in Law. Three days later we were sent to home for fifteen days' holiday. In that time my family invited all my friends and the relatives to join this occasion to our own village to give thanks through Mass.

When returned to the community I was appointed as accountant for the community as well as being put in charge of the 22 two candidates who had come for experience to know and study about our congregation. I did this for two years then my congregation asked to me to move to another state to do my Bachelor degree. I chose commerce because it would help me to do the Accounts. I was sent with two of my sisters and we three sisters went to state called Trichy. It is known as the hottest place in Tamil Nadu. I continued as the accountant there too. I was there for three years. In this three-year period, I learned many things like doing

by myself and dealing many other house problems. I visited some of the high-level people and made new friends and visited many other places which I hadn't visited before. I enjoyed this time with my two other sisters. Two years later one more sister arrived to live with us. Every day we would go to the university and coming back in the evening to do work at the community.

And in the evening we tutored about 20 to 25 children. At the end my final year my delegate Superior phoned me to go and see her. I said I can't because it is Friday and the following Monday I have an exam, so I can't travel. But my Delegate superior said bring your books with you. You can take a train Friday night arrive Saturday morning and leave have a talk and go back Sunday night so that you can arrive for the exam on Monday morning.

Not only that while you are travelling you can have your studies. I couldn't say no to her so I prepared myself and went to Kerala to see my Superior. While I was traveling, my mind was wondering why she called me? What did she want to talk about? And what is going to happen to me?

I arrived on Saturday morning she asked me to freshen up. I took some rest then I came to visit her. She took my hand and walked towards to the Chapel. I was worried why she was doing this. At the end, we reached the Chapel she held my hand in front of the Altar and she said I am going to ask you something, please do not say No. Within that second my mind clicked and I thought that she was going to send me somewhere. I said just tell me sister let me see whether I can say Yes or No? So she said could you please go to Australia to be part of the community there In Adelaide. I looked at her and said please give me time to think. I love to help, but not at the moment. She asked why and I said I want finish my bachelor.

So, in 2005, April I applied for the passport which I received within three months with some difficulties. Then my sisters who were in Adelaide helped me to apply for a visa. while they processed my visa, I was preparing for my Final Vows. It is called Perpetual Vows. It means I am offering myself totally until the end of my life.

On 20th August, 2005 I made my final commitment then went home for three days. I left India a few days later and arrived on 30th August in Australia. Not only that, this was the first time I had been out of the Country.

Hopefully the next one will be the last one.

Looking for a 'with-it' PPC

Is your Parish Pastoral Council (PPC) 'with-it'—by which I mean, 'current, sharp and smart'?

Meeting monthly, and largely out of the awareness of most parishioners, the PPC, at its best, strives to assist our Parish Priest with matters relating to the healthy pastoral oversight and strategic mission of the parish. You could call this a 'missional mode': a healthy parish does more than merely exist for itself, it brings the Gospel alive in a particular area.

There's a common temptation, however, for the PPC to effortlessly default to 'keeping the lights on'—that is, simply ensuring that the bare minimum of pastoral functions operate adequately. You could call this a 'maintenance mode': the parish serves itself, and is often too preoccupied internally to do much more than this.

It's always difficult to neatly categorise the PPC, which is made up of people dedicated to giving local expression to the Gospel in our place and time. But how would you notice whether the PPC is more missional than maintenance in its focus? I believe two recent events signal that our PPC, along with other parishes, is moving towards a more consistent 'missional mode':

Your PPC been working through the renewal vision articulated in the *Renewing Parishes* document since its meeting with the Renewal Task Force in February 2016. Its current focus is to engage with as many parishioners as possible to ensure that the work of renewal becomes a 'ground-up', rather 'top-down' effort. That was the purpose of the Parish Gathering, held on Sunday, 23 October, attended by around 40 parishioners. Feedback from those who attended was quite positive and hopeful. Individual PPC members introduced the various markers of parish renewal, both to explain the markers and foster small group discussion. Mons Ian also explained that Hallett Cove will welcome a new parish priest following his retirement in late 2018. The PPC will report on its ongoing efforts throughout 2017.



The *Renewing Parishes* document highlights eight key characteristics of parish renewal. If you missed out on attending the Parish Gathering, feel free to email Pat McKenna at the Hallett Cove parish office on hcparrish@adam.com.au to receive a copy. Look out also for the A3 laminated poster in the church foyer highlighting the main markers of parish renewal. Any member of the PPC can talk you through the document.

The Diocesan Spring Gathering (DSG) was opportunity for parish leadership teams from across the diocese to share in the vision of diocesan renewal with Archbishop Philip Wilson and one another.

Over 370 people assembled at Hilton Adelaide for the all-day event on Saturday, 29 October 2016. This was the first time such a gathering had taken place in Adelaide, although the last similar gathering was held over 30 years ago.

Hallett Cove was well represented at the DSG: Mons Ian, Fr Peter, Sr Kanistal, Claire Pinson (PPC Secretary), Craig Fosdike (Principal), Dylan Barnes (Youth Minister), Holly Roberts (Youth Minister)—along with others who attended as teachers or principals in schools located in other parishes. I attended too, but was heavily involved in the running of the event itself due to my work at the Diocesan Centre.

In less than two years, this parish will face a period of change—which brings with it an opportunity for creative response and renewal.

Hallett Cove has a rich and remarkable history of parish resilience. We continue to take heart in the reality that God's Spirit

is ahead of us, drawing us forward and together so that the Gospel of Christ may shine brightly through us for the sake of the community in which we live. Please pray for your PPC, that it will be faithful in wedding the gifts of the laity to the gifts of the parish priest, so that we will be the people God wants us to be to joyfully serve the world God loves.

The Vinnies Conference is currently experiencing our most busy time of the year. We are eagerly selling the Vinnies Christmas cards, the Columban calendars and the Josephite calendars through the bookshop which we operate throughout the year as one of our forms of fundraising.



We are preparing Christmas Hampers, both food and toys, for the needy families we assist, and then arranging to deliver those. The Giving Tree is invaluable for this, and we are very fortunate that the St Martin de Porres School collects food and toys for us to make up the hampers. This year the school has agreed to actually make up some hampers for us which will assist us greatly. We are most grateful for the support we receive from the parish and the school at this time of year which allows us to deliver hampers to needy families in our area. Last year our hampers went to 42 adults and 41 children.

While we are busy right now, it is a most rewarding time for us. The smiles and heartfelt thanks we receive when delivering Christmas hampers is a particularly joyful experience and represents a culmination of the hard work our volunteers do throughout the year.

The Hallett Cove Vinnies has an annual expenditure of around \$12,000 and is self-funding. This means that we aim to cover the costs of the assistance we give through your donations and the funds we raise from lottery ticket sales, sausage sizzles, the bookshop and the winter and Christmas appeals. We are fortunate that we can obtain food through Foodbank at reduced cost which has allowed us to increase our level of assistance at no extra cost.

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Peace Lamps and Peace Doves from the Holy Land

We are all aware that Christmas is almost here - our shops have been telling us for weeks!! For Christians, Christmas is more than shopping and presents, it's a celebration of the birth of Jesus, who came to bring peace into our world. Peace is very much needed grace in our world today, and the Holy Land, the birth place of Jesus, is no exception.



Peace lamps and peace doves are being made in the Holy Land in the village of Taybeh, about 30 kms from Bethlehem. **Taybeh is the last remaining Christian village in the Holy Land.** It was Fr Raed, former Parish Priest of Taybeh, who initiated this project in 2004, to create employment for the young people in the village so that they didn't have to leave the village to find work. The project is known as the Olive Branch Foundation and the goal is *'to place a peace lamp in every single church in the world, and to unite as many Christians and people of faith in a common prayer for peace in the Holy Land'*.



In the 3 years since the South Australian Council of Churches began bringing the lamps and doves into South Australia, approximately 640 have found a place in our churches and homes and over \$20,000 has been forwarded to Caritas Jerusalem, where Fr Raed is currently the Director.

If you haven't already had an opportunity to purchase a Peace Lamp (\$44) or a Peace Dove (\$20), you can do so by contacting the South Australian Council of Churches (8215 0300) in the city, or locally by phoning Dawn and John Sullivan (8295 6966). They have been part of this project in South Australia since its inception. You will be helping to provide employment in the Christian village of Taybeh. A lamp or dove in your home will be a reminder to pray for peace in our world, especially the Holy Land. They may also make a good Christmas present for that hard to buy for person!

Police Check for volunteers

It is the policy and practice of the Catholic Archdiocese of Adelaide that individuals who have a responsibility through their role within the Archdiocese in either a paid or voluntary capacity, will be required to undergo a Department for Communities & Social Inclusion (DCSI) Working with Children screening which is processed through the Archdiocesan Police Check Unit. The screening process is completed on line and will require applicants have access to an email address.

This is a new process and the advantages are that our organisation will meet Government mandated standard of checks, community expectations will be met, the level of checks will be optimum for those working with children and in line with recommendations from the Royal Commission. General exemptions will include all children under 18 years of age, all volunteers 80 years and above who have previously received clearance from the Catholic Archdiocese of Adelaide are exempted from renewal checks, some occasional volunteers and some contracts etc.

If you have a current DCSI clearance, please email me a copy in the parish office and I can add you to my up to date clearance list.



