From our Pastoral Associate

Wow, Christmas and holidays have come and gone, we have had just a few weeks of the 'time of order' – or 'Ordinary time' and suddenly, Ash Wednesday has arrived and we are into Lent again. The last day of Summer is here too, and next week we will be beginning Autumn.

We could be lulled into thinking that everything is as it always was, but in our parish, this is not the case. This week the funeral of our very first Hallett Cove Parish Priest was celebrated here – Fr Tony Papps was not old – his 66th birthday would have been today (the day before his funeral). He had had health challenges for a long time – had a pace-maker fitted when he was our young 42 year-old priest.

I recall that he had an office in the School admin building and he had a little note on the pin-board; it read "Celibates need love too – hug one today!" And we did love Fr Tony, and the school staff and children appreciated having him present here with us. We send our prayers of thanks to God for him and all he was for us in our community, and we send our love and sympathy to his family.

Those who came before Fr Tony, especially Sr Catherine Vowels – who died only last year – had a vision for this parish which was very much shared by all our parishioners – back then we were attached to the Brighton Parish and very keen to become independent. The parishioners opted to build the School first (with an adaptable room for celebrating weekend Masses) so the children and families would know they belonged – to God and to this community. Next, they built the Parish House so we could (under Canon Law) become an independent parish and house our own Priest. Third, they built the lovely church we now have. They had a novel way of raising the large amount of money necessary – a progress chart showed how many 'bricks' we needed and as families committed to buy 'bricks' at \$20 each (I think) we slowly raised a very large amount of money from a small community. The rest of the funds were raised by taking out loans from the Catholic Church Endowment Society – that loan we may be able to finally pay off later this year!



That fledgling community really took personal responsibility for providing for their children and grandchildren and all who would come to live and learn and worship here, and now it's our turn!

Apart from the capital commitments we have – servicing the loan, running and maintaining our buildings and grounds etc., we have our recurrent costs – power, water, rates, maintenance, supplies etc. And then we really need people to help the parish to function. We are very much blessed to have many willing volunteers and helpers including our Deacon Tim, Parish Pastoral Councillors, Finance Councillors, Sacristans, cleaners, ministers, etc., and the Diocese pays our priest, but in order to keep everything running smoothly, communication happening and our Sacramental programs, etc, running, we do need our amazing Parish Secretary Pat, who is employed by us for just one day a week (although she does huge amounts in her own time), Jenny who does our accounts ½ day per week and a Pastoral Associate (currently Julie and Marion are paid for a combined 15 hours per week) and these salaries come from our recurrent funding – Planned Giving and Collections. The School helps by employing our Youth Worker and Brighton Parish have always generously supported us with an annual substantial contribution BUT.... our planned giving has fallen to a level where we are struggling to grow.

Times have changed – no longer can we simply attend Mass and go on our way; we all need to share in the ministry of BEING the Body of Christ for each other, for our community and for the world. This includes examining our commitment and challenging ourselves to give from our substance and not just from our excess. Committing to becoming more involved – 'buying bricks' (metaphorically) to build the St Martin de Porres Parish of the present and future. This year we have 4 activities planned, two social and two fundraising, plus our First Sunday of the Month morning teas after 9:15am Mass. Please plan to participate – for our sake, for your sake and for God's sake.

Hallett Cove Vinnies Christmas Hampers

The Hallett Cove Vinnies group sincerely thank everyone that supported us through donations of cash, gift cards, food & toys for our



Christmas Hampers. We received tremendous support from our Parishioners, St Martin de Porres School, Hallett Cove Community Children's Centre and the Knights of the Southern Cross.

As a result we were able to assist 28 Adults & 26 Children with food, gift vouchers & toys to the value of \$65 per person. Some of the people we visited were so thankful they became emotional and shed a few tears. They also wish to pass on their sincere thanks.

Vinnies Bushfire Appeal

So far, nationally the Vinnies Bushfire Appeal has raised \$12.5 million to support people impacted by bushfires in NSW, Queensland, Victoria, SA and the ACT. To date, more than \$2.4 million has been distributed nationally in direct cash payments with an additional \$250,000 processed ready for distribution. Vinnies volunteers have also been on the ground helping people as they deal with the immediate aftermath of fires.

In South Australia, generous donors have raised more than \$1.3 million and we are very grateful for this response.

We have been working closely with the SA Government State Recovery Office to assist with material donations as requested, and to act as a link between donors of products and services and those who require this type of assistance.

From this week, Vinnies SA has been given access to the SA Government Bushfire Recovery Centre in Lobethal in order to meet with those affected, and to begin processing applications for financial support. We are also involved in the recovery effort on Kangaroo Island.

PLENARY COUNCIL 2020

During November 2019, parishioners from the parishes of Brighton, Hallett Cove and St Ann's were invited to come together to reflect on the 6 themes to be discussed at the Plenary Council meeting being held in Adelaide from the 4 -11 October this year. The 6 themes are:

Open to Conversion, Renewal and Reform
Inclusive, Participatory and Synodal
Humble, Healing and Merciful
Missionary and Evangelising
Prayerful and Eucharistic
A Joyful, Hope filled and Servant Community

Forty-five parishioners from the 3 parishes, participated in 13 different discussion groups during the 17th, 19th and 27th November 2019. Each group was asked: "to write down the 2 or 3 emerging actions that have been drawn from the discussions". These 'action' summaries have been forwarded to the Plenary Council 2020 Writing and Discernment Groups. The papers from the 6 Discernment and Writing groups are expected to be available in May. A sample of the action summaries that have been forwarded are:



- ◇ The Church to be open to the ordination of female Deacons
- ◇ The Church to be open to the ordination of married men
- ◇ Priests who have left active ministry be invited back to administer Sacraments, especially Sacraments of Anointing and Baptism
- ◇ The Third Rite of Reconciliation be reinstated in our liturgy
- ◇ Women to have equal representation in all areas of governance in the Church
- ◇ Establish on-going groups for newly baptised to meet regularly
- ◇ Family Groups be established to assist in building a sense of belonging
- ◇ People received into the church through the RCIA continue to meet regularly
- ◇ Priests should not be solely responsible for everything in the parish and for administration of the Church. Laity should be at least equally responsible at the local parish, through to the national level. (If necessary, change Canon Law).
- ◇ As Australia recruits more and more overseas priests, there should be a dual approach:
 - (a) of welcome, tolerance and acceptance of those who are here;
 - (b) continuing assimilation in our culture of Church and ordinary life on or before arrival
- ◇ Vatican II documents to be re-introduced to assist the understanding that lay people, through their baptism, have a role to play
- ◇ The Church needs to apologise for all the injustices that have occurred, to be able to move forward.
- ◇ To have a Sorry Day for the Victims of Abuse.
- ◇ When Church teachings change, homilies and information sessions be provided to take people through a process that explains the new theology/emphasis, e.g. divorce and re-marriage.
- ◇ Make good, current theology, faith formation programmes available to everyone – young and old.
- ◇ Through homilies and statements, help, reassure and calm older Catholics who are consumed with guilt because their children/grandchildren aren't attending Mass. Offer them hope in dealing with a changing society.
- ◇ Many parents struggle because their children no longer attend church. Research to be undertaken as to why people are disenchanted with the Catholic Church, especially young people.
- ◇ That our Bishops are more visible and in touch with lay people.
- ◇ More opportunities for faith formation: workshops on variety of prayer styles; information about retreats/days of reflection; scripture; books – spiritual reading
- ◇ Liturgies that reflect the cultural make-up in our parishes, e.g. Indian, Filipino, etc..
- ◇ Allow ordinary parishioners opportunities to give witness to their faith journeys.
- ◇ That the Church does not put up barriers for people who are divorced and want to participate in the Mass. Annulment is not always the correct way to allow people to participate in the Church. There should be a discernment process. You cannot void a marriage.

These statements are excerpts from the 9 submissions forwarded to the Plenary Council Discernment and Writing Groups. Copies of these submissions are available in the Church foyer, or from the Parish Office.

Child Safe Environments Briefing for Volunteers

As you may be aware, all volunteers in our Archdiocese are mandated notifiers under the South Australian Child Protection Legislation. To ensure we hear the voices of children and have the necessary skills to identify and respond appropriately, we invite any volunteers who have not yet participated in Child Safe Environments training or an equivalent course to attend a 90 minute Volunteer Briefing session facilitated by the Archdiocesan Child Protection Unit. Please note that these briefings (or an equivalent course) are a compulsory requirement for anyone wishing to be a Eucharistic Minister.

A Volunteer Briefing will be held in the Brighton Parish on:

Wednesday 25th March, 10-11.30am in the Brighton Activity Centre

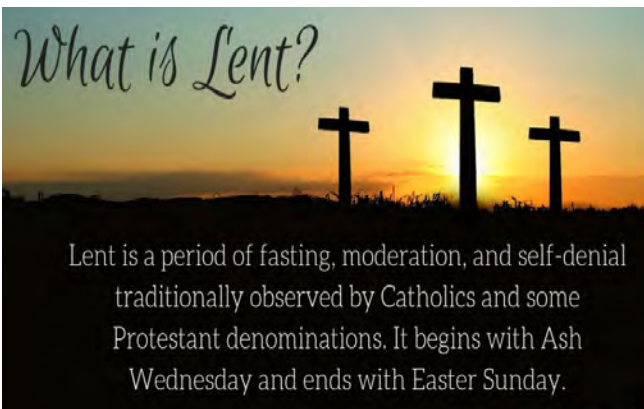
If you have attended a Child Safe Environments or RAN training within the past 3 years you do not need to attend a Volunteer Briefing.

New role for Deacon Tim

Whatever you do, do everything for the glory of God (1 Corinthians 10.31)

Some of you may be aware that at the end of 2019, the Archdiocese of Adelaide was compelled to make budget cuts that resulted in the closure of the Office of Renewing Parishes. Since early 2016, I worked substantively in this Office supporting the renewal activities of parishes, schools and communities throughout the Archdiocese.

Obviously, I was sad to leave this role. I remain grateful for the many people that I've been privileged to work alongside, mindful that the Spirit of God leads the Church ever onwards in genuine renewing regardless of formal structures.

Around the same time, my part-time role as Coordinator of the Permanent Diaconate in Australia, funded by the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference (ACBC), came to end—also due to budgetary constraints. Since being appointed by the ACBC in August 2018, I had been coordinating various support measures for approximately 200 deacons in Australia. This relatively short-lived role introduced me to many deacons, their wives and their bishops, and helped me to see at close hand how the diverse ministry of deacon is rapidly unfolding in the Australian Catholic church.

Changes of this kind are stressful because they suddenly introduce uncertainty, as many of you know all too well. However, I'm most grateful that, within a week of leaving my roles with the Archdiocese and ACBC, I was recruited to a new position within the South Australian Government—an amazingly quick turnaround, a blessing from God. When Bishop Greg O'Kelly and I recently reflected on this transition, he commented that 'the finger of God' was clearly evident. Also evident and dear to me was the prayerful support from many kind-hearted people—thank you!

My new full-time job is working for the Department of Human Services (DHS). Did you know that there are approximately 500 people living with profound disabilities who critically rely on accommodation and in-home care services provided by the Department (representing 40% of people living with profound disabilities in South Australia—the others being supported by non-government and private organisations). My role as Manager of Systems & Performance, Process Excellence is to ensure that these services are of the highest quality, are offered at sensible, cost-recovery levels and comply with National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) guidelines. Unfortunately, for many years, these invaluable services have been less than ideal in terms of quality and exorbitant in terms of costs—poor outcomes ultimately borne by people with disabilities and their families (who are already 'doing it tough').

As I begin my third month working for DHS, I'm very happy and feel well-supported by staff and managerial colleagues. Many challenges loom ahead but I feel energised to constructively and creatively face these. Believe it or not, my new job title is identical in name and general description to the job that I held in the aged care industry prior to accepting work with the Archdiocese 4 years ago.

My capacity to serve the parish and diocese as a deacon is not diminished in any way by my current work commitments. While not employed by the parish (I've never been employed by the parish), I continue to be involved (after hours and on weekends) in baptism preparation of families, baptism ceremonies, occasional weddings and funerals, scripture reflection groups, RCIA, the local ministers association (ecumenical), church cleaning, sharing homilies, and, of course, worshipping together with you during weekend Masses at St Martin de Porres church.

A deacon is one who is called to highlight the fundamental reality of all the baptised: wherever we find ourselves in our life and work—each one of has been thoughtfully placed by God to uniquely share the pure glow of Christ's ministry of total service to others for the glory of God.

Janette And Mike McPeake Celebrate 60 Years of Marriage

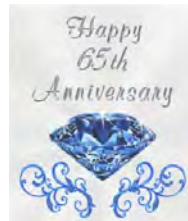


Janette and Mike married

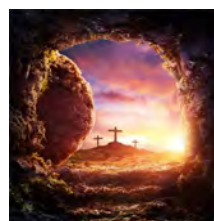
